Why is South Africa interesting?

- Fascinating microcosm in a unique country
- May hold solutions for global problems like conflict resolution, racism, and xenophobia
- Possible success for western civilization and political human rights in third world region
- Growing middle class market
- Western competition over trade for aid
- Importance for the whole of Southern Africa

More reasons to study South Africa

- Promising exemplar of South-South cooperation
- People have taken their destiny in their own hands through self-mobilising movements
- Reveals possibilities and limitations of social revolution and revolutionary socialism
- Strings to international solidarity in the North
- Competitive academic environment
- Classical cases for structural social studies

Tendencies in SA social science

- Research areas reflect historical problems
- From massification to mergers of units
- From collective enthusiasm to individualised adaptation
- Continuing absence of black researchers
- Affirmative action, black empowerment and political correctness
- Internationalisation of leading universities

Some basic problems of research

- Academic struggles for intellectual dominance and knowledge-power
- Heavy weight on continuities in history
- Reductionism in views on class, race, or gender identities
- Empiricism placing emphasis on single events
- Balances of source critique, neutrality, subjectivity, and objectivity
- Political use of research results

Classical areas of research in SA social studies I

- Correlations between race attitudes, class relations, state power, and culture
- Rationalities of growth, economic dysfunctions, and criteria of success
- Transition from pre-capitalist to modern agriculture
- Processes of industrialisation, urbanisation, and proletarianisation
- Statutory, white, political domination. Official racial segregation in institutions, laws, and procedures

Research areas in SA social studies II

- Everyday experiences, individual living conditions, identity, traditions, and health
- Reasons for protest and other forms of popular social and political expression
- Processes of transformation and democratisation
- Identification of essential, underlying societal features (nation, gender, interests)
- Bearings of theory and methodology (historiography, interdisciplinary debate)
